A protocol has been developed for DRMC, the DRMC Standing Committee and the Secretariat on how we will respond to disasters when requested by National Committees.2. DRMC is in the process of developing a website that will share technical information and links to other websites on disaster planning and response. 3. DRMC is collaborating with other ICOM committees and the Secretariat to develop conferences/training in disaster response and planning
Could you please mention what you consider your IC's three main weak points?:	1. Confusion between the DRMC IC and the DRMC Standing Committee - many ICOM members and non members do not realize that DRMC is an international committee that accepts members and thinks we are part of the Standing Committee which has had a negative effect in increasing membership 2. The pandemic has limited active participation and development of activities because so many museums are closed and museum staff is not working. 3. Active disasters (armed conflict related to Afghanistan and Ukraine, earthquakes, floods) have occupied several board members board members and reduced the time spent with DRMC - but provided useful aide to affected museums and museum staff. Disasters seem to be increasing every year!
